The Manchurian violet is a flower that has been popular for centuries, with numerous species native to the city. City Tree  
**Asian Bayberry**

Mention of this tree can be found in folklore concerning Minamoto no Yoritomo and Hojo Masako, both of whom have connections to the city, and thus has deep significance for the citizens of Izunokuni. Its leaves are notoriously difficult to tear from the side, and this is symbolic of the strong bonds between the city's government and citizens as they work together, unified, to ensure its continued development.
